Bylaw change fails

At the March 28th General Membership Meeting, Vice-commodore Mary Lou Chambers proposed two changes to the UKSC bylaws. These changes would allow an associate member to serve on the board of directors and would also allow this associate member to vote. Present bylaws state that "Normally an Associate member shall have no voting power and can hold no office".

There was spirited discussion of the issue both pro and con. Members pointed out that any member is welcome at board meetings and can express his or her views to the board, so change is not needed. Others pointed out that it would be nice if associates were included in the operations of the club. Clarification of the definition of an Associate member was asked for and required reading of the specific bylaw by the Commodore. But in the end the membership voted down the motion.

Fleet Captain Analyzes Value of Regattas

We've just completed several back to back weeks hosting sailors from one end of the spectrum to another, from green Opti sailors getting their first regatta experience to several world class sailors competing in a hot developmental class, the Moths! Our founders created a club dedicated to promoting sailing in all its branches. Its original focus was on racing, and racing still remains a mainstay of club activities, but "sailing in all its branches" includes cruising, youth sailing, and day sailing. I am proud to be Fleet Captain of a club that has included ALL of these sailing activities this past year!

Our club includes several members who are not active sailors, for various reasons, but who still enjoy our club's beautiful bayside location and the comfort of a clubhouse where "everybody knows your name." Some of these club members have expressed concern about these regattas that attract so many non-club members, resulting in a lack of parking and resultant limitation to club facilities. I have been directly approached by only ONE member about this, but I have heard about others who have appropriately directed their concerns to the Vice or Commodore. In addition to experiencing these restrictions, members are concerned about financial returns to the club. I hope I am able to satisfy your concerns!

First, we are a sailing club. It's the reason we were founded, it's what our founders hoped to create a legacy about, and it remains a requirement of membership that prospective members serve on the water in one way or another. More sailing = satisfying our mission!

Second, we are also, in reality, a seasonal club. Despite having great sailing weather year round, we definitely have more members using the club during the fall/winter/early spring months, while much fewer members use the club during the summer. In many ways that is AWESOME for us locals because it is almost deserted here in summer, so we get to throw wild naked sailing parties* if we want, but it's BAD for the club's financial bottom line.

I understand that parking and space is an issue and some members feel shut off from the club while we have these regattas. We don't have a lot of real estate for sure! However, the disadvantages during a *few* weeks of the year are an advantage to *all members throughout the year*. We have come to learn our maximum number of regatta participants and are careful not to exceed it (you really should come by the club during the youth regatta just to see what 100 youth sailors looks like!)

So what are the benefits of hosting these regattas with so many non-members?

REVENUE

These folks pay, and pay well, to enjoy our club's amenities. The money they pony up helps us keep our dues low so that all members can enjoy the club at lower rates than we would without them.

Each regatta is set up differently; some registrations include a meal and/or a shirt; others are just the price of admission to the club, so to speak, and everything else is paid separately. The Moth regatta fee included dry storage for their boxes for the duration of their series.

In addition to the actual regatta registration revenue, these people drink at the bar! They eat hot dogs and chips and drink beer or soda. Many members enjoy coming to the club when we host these sailors, and they drink at the bar and eat the meals too. A breakdown of the revenues generated is shown at the end of this article.

These numbers might not seem that big to you. To give you an understanding of how much they contribute to our bottom line, we need to make at least \$1000 per weekend on the bar to cover expenses and overhead. A typical summer weekend club event grosses around \$500; some of these regattas generate four times that amount in one weekend!

EXPOSURE

I don't mean the full frontal kind; I mean the kind of publicity that money can't buy: social media and word of mouth. People come to our club, they like the sailing location, the friendly dockmasters, the cheerful members. Even if they can't join, they can tell their friends about us. Plus, we get publicity on cutting edge websites like Sailing Anarchy and Sailing Scuttlebutt. The regattas give us street cred in the sailing world by providing topics for articles in Southwinds, for instance. That is all great publicity. New residents may not read the local paper but if they're sailors, they're likely to do a Google search and the more mentions we have on other websites, the easier we are to find.

I hope that this article helps everyone understand the benefits of hosting these regattas. For myself, I truly enjoy the energy that these sailors bring to our club. Whether I'm talking with a world class champion or Joe Sailor from the club in a little town in Ohio, I enjoy sharing and learning more about this great sport of ours. Based on the number of volunteers that came out to help with the events, or just to gawk at the cool and unusual, it's apparent that I'm not alone!

The board of County Commissioners recently voted to proceed with the development of a public mooring field for 100 boats in Buttonwood Sound. Point Of View RV Park is interested in partnering with Monroe County to provide shoreside services, including dinghy dockage, showers, laundry, and pump out service. A mooring field of this size would significantly alter the character of Buttonwood Sound and possibly present security problems for UKSC. After a brief discussion at the general membership meeting on March 28, a committee was formed to research and respond to the proposed mooring field. The committee includes Sharon Berry, Kathy Hulbert, Ginette Hughes, and Dewey Jackson. Any other club members who are interested in participating in this committee should contact Sharon Berry.

Elections for the new Board of Directors and Officers will take place at the General Membership Meeting on April 25. Please show your support by attending the meeting.


Marlin and Glander Races Moved To The Bayside!






